Apache-Sitgreaves National Forests



Caldwell Cabin

Nestled among the tall pine trees overlooking a large grassy meadow, Caldwell Cabin sits at an elevation of 7,600 ft. Caldwell originated as a one-room cabin constructed in the 1920s from hand-hewn logs.

Coconino National Forest



Apache Maid

Constructed in 1908, this cozy cabin served as a ranch house and a ranger station. Tucked among the pines at the base of Apache Maid Mountain, it is just three hours north of Phoenix. Nearby Stoneman Lake, Beaver Creek, and Sedona offer popular recreation activities.



Crescent Moon Cabin

Located in scenic Sedona, this historic ranch house most definitely has a view! It sits near the base of Cathedral Rock, whose "red rock" landscape is one of the most photographed sites in the world.



Fernow Cabin

This rustic three-bedroom log cabin is situated in a beautiful ponderosa pine setting on the Mogollon Rim. Located in an isolated scenic draw, the site provides privacy and great opportunities for getting back to nature.



Kendrick Cabin

This vintage fire guard station has three bedrooms and is located in the scenic Kendrick Park area. It has wonderful views of the San Francisco Peaks, Kendrick Mountain, and the surrounding forest. The sunsets here are unparalleled.

Coronado National Forest



Canelo Ranger Office

Tucked off the road on the west side of Turkey Creek, the bungalow-style building from the 1930s continues to greet visitors from near and far. This former ranger's office has three rooms, including one bedroom, a bathroom, and a kitchen.



Canelo Ranger Residence

Built in the 1930s by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), the Canelo Ranger Residence was once home to the Sierra Vista District Ranger. The six-room residence has two bedrooms, a bathroom, a kitchen, a dining room, and a living room.



Half Moon Ranch

Nestled in the scenic Dragoon Mountains, Half Moon Ranch is in the east Cochise Stronghold. It is set in a dramatically beautiful canyon surrounded by granite spires, massive boulders, and golden cliffs. The house has two bedrooms, two full bathrooms, a living room, a dining room, and a kitchen.



Kent Springs Cabin

The Kent Springs Cabin is in the scenic Madera Canyon, 15 miles east of Green Valley, Arizona, and within a one-hour drive from Tucson. Boasting unique natural features and historical sites, the secluded and private cabin is an ideal location for guests seeking relaxation and recreation. The residence consists of 1,500 square feet of indoor space, including two bedrooms, one full bathroom, two living rooms, and a fully equipped kitchen.



Kentucky Camp

Kentucky Camp is nestled in the scenic Santa Rita Mountains near Sonoita, Arizona. The area consists of five adobe buildings: the headquarters, two cabins, the assay office, and the remains of a barn. A small three-room adobe cabin and headquarters building have been restored for public use.



Palisades Ranger Residence Cabin

Travel up the Santa Catalina Mountain to the Palisades Ranger Residence where cooler temperatures, modern amenities, and a myriad of recreation opportunities greet you. The five-room cabin consists of a bedroom, a dining room, a living room, a bathroom, and a fully equipped kitchen.



Portal Bunkhouse

The bunkhouse was constructed in 1933 by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The structure is one of the finest remaining examples of river-cobble masonry construction from that era. This small two-room cabin will take you back to simpler times when a bedroom and kitchen/dining room were the standard-sized home.



Portal CCC House

The Portal CCC House is located at the entrance to Cave Creek Canyon at an elevation of 5,000 feet. Cave Creek Canyon is world-renowned for its dramatic rock formations and diverse wildlife. The cabin has two bedrooms, one bathroom, and a large kitchen/dining area.



Shaw House

This historic three-bedroom rock house is set in the spectacularly scenic Dragoon Mountains in the east Cochise Stronghold. Nearby trails provide excellent hiking, mountain biking, and horseback riding opportunities, while rock climbers and birders may enjoy recreational opportunities off the beaten trail. The house has three bedrooms, two bathrooms, a living room, a dining room, and a kitchen.



Sollers Cabin

Located off the scenic Mt. Lemmon Highway, the Sollers Cabin sits at the end of a dirt road and provides a unique recreational opportunity for hikers, picnickers, birders, bicyclists, artists, photographers, researchers, and nature lovers of every age. The large two-story, seven-room cabin consists of three bedrooms, one and a half bathrooms, a dining/living room, and a fully equipped kitchen.

Kaibab National Forest



Big Springs

Big Springs cabins are located an hour's drive from the North Rim of the Grand Canyon and about a 35-minute drive from the Rainbow Rim Trail, a winding hiking and mountain biking trail that offers stunning canyon views. The six cabins available for rent are part of the Big Springs Administrative Center, listed on the National Register. Each cabin can house up to four people; renters share use of the shower house, fully-furnished kitchen, and dining hall.



Hull Cabin

Hull Cabin is the oldest surviving historic cabin near the Grand Canyon South Rim and is located wholly within the newly designated Baaj Nwaavjo I'tah Kukveni—Ancestral Footprints of the Grand Canyon National Monument. This rustic cabin was built in 1889 as part of a sheep ranch and became a Forest Service ranger station in 1907. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.



Jumpup Cabin

If you are looking for quiet, solitude, and an escape from the digital age, then consider a stay at Jumpup Cabin. This 1904 cabin is situated adjacent to the Kanab Creek Wilderness, which winds into the Grand Canyon. The views are stunning, and Jumpup Trailhead is a just stone's throw away. Be prepared to rough it, as amenities are limited.



Spring Valley

Enjoy spectacular views, cross-country ski trails, and time "away from it all" at this furnished abode. The former ranger station has an additional bunkhouse and a maximum capacity of 14 people. The cabin is available year-round.

Prescott National Forest



Groom Creek Schoolhouse

The Groom Creek Schoolhouse was established in 1896 and represents the civilization of this early mining community. In the 1930s the schoolhouse was rebuilt of native stone and was an active school until 1952. The building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is now available for day use rental. Great for events!



Horsethief Cabin

Horsethief Cabin is nestled in the Bradshaw Mountains, near Horsethief Basin Lake and Castle Creek Wilderness. Horsethief Basin Recreation Area provides a variety of recreation activities for those wishing to enjoy both the heritage and the beauty of the Bradshaw Mountains.



Mingus Cabin (coming soon)

Situated on the top of Mingus Mountain, between Jerome and Prescott Valley, this quaint lookout residence cabin was built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s and offers spectacular views of the valley below.



Palace Station (coming soon)

Experience one of the oldest cabins in Arizona! Waystations were scarce in Arizona's early history. Palace Station served as a safe harbor for wagons traveling the Senator Highway between Crown King and Prescott, the territorial capital.



Sycamore Cabin

Currently on the National Register of Historic Places, Sycamore Cabin is a former ranger station situated among the cottonwood trees that line Sycamore Creek. We encourage you to enjoy some time "away from it all" with the serenity and spectacular views of the Great Western Trail and other local hiking trails.

The national forests of Arizona's "Rooms with a View" cabin rental program have facilities available with locations ranging from the rim of the Grand Canyon to the granite domes of Cochise Stronghold, offering visitors a range of settings and amenities. Some cabins are rustic while others are more modern, but all are situated in beautiful settings across Arizona.

Be prepared for changeable mountain weather, cold nights, thunderstorms, extreme heat, and snow. No matter where you are staying, the weather can change quickly in Arizona.

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Most of the cabins are historic and need your help to remain in working order. Therefore, treat the cabins gently, and report any damage to the local forest.

Please do not leave food at the cabins. If you brought it, please take it back with you at the end of your stay.

Please check with the reservation system to see if pets are allowed in the cabin you rent. If you do bring a pet please:

- Keep your pet leashed when required. Some rentals require that your pet remain outside and leashed.
- Prevent your pet from harassing or chasing wildlife.
- Clean up after your pet.
- Do not leave your pet unattended in the cabin.
